Learning objective

Use sentence and paragraph clues to infer the likely meaning of unfamiliar words, then verify when needed.

Use this pack well

- Model the first example aloud, then let the learner try.
- Ask “How do you know?” more often than “Are you finished?”.
- Use real objects, talk, movement or observation when the activity suggests it.
- Stop or shorten the session if attention or enjoyment drops.
- Open-ended pages can have many successful answers.

Learn the idea

1 Nearby words can provide examples, contrasts, definitions or explanations.

2 A guessed meaning should fit the whole sentence.

3 Readers can verify uncertain meanings with a trusted glossary or dictionary.

Talk about it

Explain one idea in your own words. Give an example from real life, a drawing or an object if that helps.

Infer the meaning of “drowsy” from a sentence with clues.

Identify whether a clue is an example, contrast or explanation.

Replace a target word with a synonym that keeps the sentence meaning.

Spot a guessed meaning that does not fit the paragraph.

Write a sentence that gives enough context to infer a made-up word.

Try it beyond the page

Real-world / hands-on connection

Choose one unfamiliar word from a trusted book, infer its meaning from context, then verify it.

Before you finish

What did you notice?

What evidence, object or example helped you?

What would you change if you tried again?
