Grown-up help & answer guidance

Use this page as light guidance rather than a score sheet. Encourage the learner to explain their thinking and try again when needed.

Helpful routine

1. Read the instruction together.
2. Let the learner try independently.
3. Ask: "How did you work that out?"
4. Correct one small thing at a time.
5. Finish with a success they can name.

Answer guidance

Many pages are open practice, tracing, colouring, reading or writing tasks, so there may be more than one acceptable response. For number facts, check the calculation. For language tasks, look for a sensible word or sentence that follows the instruction. For reading tasks, accept answers supported by the passage.
