Learning objective

Edit writing systematically for sentence boundaries, agreement, punctuation, clarity, precision and consistency.

Use this pack well

- Model the first example aloud, then let the learner try.
- Ask “How do you know?” more often than “Are you finished?”.
- Use real objects, talk, movement or observation when the activity suggests it.
- Stop or shorten the session if attention or enjoyment drops.
- Open-ended pages can have many successful answers.

Learn the idea

1 Editing is easier when one type of issue is checked at a time.

2 Punctuation supports meaning; it is not decoration.

3 Style revision often removes repetition and vague wording rather than making every sentence longer.

Talk about it

Explain one idea in your own words. Give an example from real life, a drawing or an object if that helps.

Repair comma splices and sentence fragments in original examples.

Check subject-verb agreement in complex sentences.

Use commas, colons or quotation punctuation where appropriate.

Replace vague pronouns with clear references.

Complete a five-pass edit: meaning, structure, sentences, words, conventions.

Try it beyond the page

Real-world / hands-on connection

Take one old paragraph and edit it in separate passes rather than trying to fix everything at once.

Before you finish

What did you notice?

What evidence, object or example helped you?

What would you change if you tried again?

Create something

Your project

Build a personal editing checklist from the five errors you most often need to check.

1. Why edit in passes?

2. What should punctuation help a reader understand?

3. Is the longest sentence always the best one?

Answer & discussion notes
