Learning objective

Use an editing routine to improve sentence boundaries, tense consistency, punctuation and clarity.

Use this pack well

- Model the first example aloud, then let the learner try.
- Ask “How do you know?” more often than “Are you finished?”.
- Use real objects, talk, movement or observation when the activity suggests it.
- Stop or shorten the session if attention or enjoyment drops.
- Open-ended pages can have many successful answers.

Learn the idea

1 Editing is different from generating first-draft ideas.

2 Sentence boundaries help readers follow complete thoughts.

3 Tense and viewpoint should stay consistent unless there is a reason to change.

Talk about it

Explain one idea in your own words. Give an example from real life, a drawing or an object if that helps.

Correct three run-on or fragmented sentences.

Edit a paragraph with inconsistent past/present tense.

Add commas to a simple list and punctuation to dialogue.

Replace one ambiguous pronoun with a clear noun.

Use an editing checklist: sentence, tense, punctuation, spelling, meaning.

Try it beyond the page

Real-world / hands-on connection

Edit one paragraph of your own writing after a short break from it; read it aloud slowly.

Before you finish

What did you notice?

What evidence, object or example helped you?

What would you change if you tried again?

Create something

Your project

Create a five-symbol editing code and use it on a short original paragraph.

Use this space for planning, drawing, mapping, designing or notes.

CHALLENGE

Think deeper

1. Should editing happen only once?

2. Why read writing aloud?

3. What is a sentence fragment?

Quick review

1. In one sentence, explain the big idea of “Edit for Grammar, Punctuation & Clarity”.

2. Draw or write one example that shows you understand.

3. Choose one activity from this pack and explain the strategy you used.

4. Write one question you still have.

Answer & discussion notes

Use these as guidance, not scripts. Open questions can have different successful responses when the reasoning is sensible and evidence-based.

1. Suggested response

No; writers may edit in passes.

2. Suggested response

It can reveal missing words, awkward flow or punctuation needs.

3. Suggested response

An incomplete group of words presented as a full sentence.

Review before publication

Check age fit, factual accuracy, clarity, accessibility, rights provenance and whether the activity works in practice. This file remains a review copy until those checks are signed off.
