Learning objective

Connect observable animal features with possible functions while avoiding unsupported claims.

Use this pack well

- Model the first example aloud, then let the learner try.
- Ask “How do you know?” more often than “Are you finished?”.
- Use real objects, talk, movement or observation when the activity suggests it.
- Stop or shorten the session if attention or enjoyment drops.
- Open-ended pages can have many successful answers.

Learn the idea

1 Animals have structures and behaviours that can help them meet needs.

2 A feature-function explanation should be supported by reliable biological information.

3 Similar needs can be met in different ways by different species.

Talk about it

Explain one idea in your own words. Give an example from real life, a drawing or an object if that helps.

Match webbed feet, thick fur, camouflage and beaks to carefully worded possible functions.

Compare two fictional animals living in different habitats.

Separate observation “the bird has a long beak” from inference “it uses the beak to...”.

Explain why not every trait is an “adaptation story” we can guess from appearance.

Write one animal question that needs a reliable reference source.

Try it beyond the page

Real-world / hands-on connection

Use an adult-selected wildlife source to check one feature-function claim rather than guessing from a picture.

Before you finish

What did you notice?

What evidence, object or example helped you?

What would you change if you tried again?

Create an animal fact card with three verified facts and one unanswered research question.

Think deeper

1. Is “it looks useful” enough evidence for a biological claim?

2. What is an observation?

3. Why compare reliable sources?
