Learning objective

Create repeating print patterns and deliberately introduce variation.

Use this pack well

- Model the first example aloud, then let the learner try.
- Ask “How do you know?” more often than “Are you finished?”.
- Use real objects, talk, movement or observation when the activity suggests it.
- Stop or shorten the session if attention or enjoyment drops.
- Open-ended pages can have many successful answers.

Learn the idea

1 a motif is a repeated design element

2 translation/repetition can make rhythm

3 variation can change size, rotation, spacing or colour

Talk about it

Explain one idea in your own words. Give an example from real life, a drawing or an object if that helps.

Design one simple stamp motif using safe materials/digital tools.

Repeat it with equal spacing.

Make a second row with rotation.

Introduce one planned variation and explain.

Spot accidental versus deliberate changes in a sample pattern.

Try it beyond the page

Real-world / hands-on connection

Try one process with real art materials or the BrightPencil Creative Studio. Focus on exploration rather than copying a finished example.

What did you notice?

What evidence, object or example helped you?

What would you change if you tried again?

Your project

Create a wrapping-paper-sized pattern swatch with a named repeat rule and one variation.

CHALLENGE

Think deeper

1. Which artistic choice was most deliberate?

2. What changed after you looked again or tested the work?

3. How could another artist solve the same brief differently?

Quick review

1. In one sentence, explain the big idea of “Print, Repeat & Vary”.

2. Draw or write one example that shows you understand.

3. Choose one activity from this pack and explain the strategy you used.

4. Write one question you still have.

Answer & discussion notes

Use these as guidance, not scripts. Open questions can have different successful responses when the reasoning is sensible and evidence-based.

1. Suggested response

Name a specific choice involving line, shape, colour, texture, space or form.

2. Suggested response

Describe a revision based on observation/testing.

3. Suggested response

Many different solutions can be successful when they communicate the intended idea.

Review before publication

Check age fit, factual accuracy, clarity, accessibility, rights provenance and whether the activity works in practice. This file remains a review copy until those checks are signed off.
