Learning objective

Use a narrative to connect water care, safe observation and multiple explanations.

Use this pack well

- Model the first example aloud, then let the learner try.
- Ask “How do you know?” more often than “Are you finished?”.
- Use real objects, talk, movement or observation when the activity suggests it.
- Stop or shorten the session if attention or enjoyment drops.
- Open-ended pages can have many successful answers.

Read the story

PART 1

After a wet week, Amina noticed a covered rain barrel beside the community greenhouse. She asked what the collected water was used for.

PART 2

The gardener explained that it watered outdoor plants, but drinking water followed different safety rules and treatment.

PART 3

Amina measured how full the barrel looked using marked levels on the outside; she did not open or climb on it.

PART 4

After several dry days, the level was lower. Amina recorded the change and asked whether plant watering explained all of it.

PART 5

The gardener said evaporation and small leaks could also matter, so they planned a safer investigation rather than guessing.

Why was the barrel water not treated as drinking water?

How did Amina observe safely?

What change did she record?

Why did the gardener suggest more than one explanation?

What could a safe next investigation measure?

Try it beyond the page

Real-world / hands-on connection

Retell the story to an adult using beginning - problem/question - evidence/action - ending.

Before you finish

What did you notice?

What evidence, object or example helped you?

What would you change if you tried again?

Create something

Your project

Create a sixth scene or short response that fits the evidence and tone of the story.

Use this space for planning, drawing, mapping, designing or notes.

CHALLENGE

Think deeper

1. How did Amina observe safely?

2. Why did the gardener suggest more than one explanation?

3. What message can you infer without pretending there is only one “correct moral”?

Quick review

1. In one sentence, explain the big idea of “The Rain-Barrel Question”.

2. Draw or write one example that shows you understand.

3. Choose one activity from this pack and explain the strategy you used.

4. Write one question you still have.

Answer & discussion notes

Use these as guidance, not scripts. Open questions can have different successful responses when the reasoning is sensible and evidence-based.

1. Suggested response

Use the relevant story detail.

2. Suggested response

Use the relevant later story evidence.

3. Suggested response

Accept a reasonable inference supported by the text.

Review before publication

Check age fit, factual accuracy, clarity, accessibility, rights provenance and whether the activity works in practice. This file remains a review copy until those checks are signed off.
