Learning objective

Apply child-safe rules to accounts, photos, location, messages, external links and passwords under parent authority.

Use this pack well

- Model the first example aloud, then let the learner try.
- Ask “How do you know?” more often than “Are you finished?”.
- Use real objects, talk, movement or observation when the activity suggests it.
- Stop or shorten the session if attention or enjoyment drops.
- Open-ended pages can have many successful answers.

Learn the idea

1 Personal information can identify or locate someone.

2 A friendly username/avatar does not prove a person is known or trustworthy.

3 Children should follow trusted-adult rules for accounts, messaging, purchases and external links.

Talk about it

Explain one idea in your own words. Give an example from real life, a drawing or an object if that helps.

Sort examples into public / private / ask adult first.

Choose what to do if an app asks for full name and exact location.

Explain why posting another person's photo needs permission.

Practise closing an unexpected link/pop-up.

Identify why passwords and verification codes stay private.

Try it beyond the page

Real-world / hands-on connection

Review the BrightPencil “Kind - Private - Ask First” rule with a parent/caregiver.

Answer & discussion notes

Use these as guidance, not scripts. Open questions can have different successful responses when the reasoning is sensible and evidence-based.

1. Suggested response

Use a concrete example rather than a ranking.

2. Suggested response

A trusted adult/teacher/caregiver or appropriate professional.

3. Suggested response

The next step should be observable and achievable.

Review before publication

Check age fit, factual accuracy, clarity, accessibility, rights provenance and whether the activity works in practice. This file remains a review copy until those checks are signed off.
