Learning objective

Plan a safe small-scale geographic investigation using observation, counts, sketches and evidence-based conclusions.

Use this pack well

- Model the first example aloud, then let the learner try.
- Ask “How do you know?” more often than “Are you finished?”.
- Use real objects, talk, movement or observation when the activity suggests it.
- Stop or shorten the session if attention or enjoyment drops.
- Open-ended pages can have many successful answers.

Learn the idea

1 Fieldwork begins with a focused question.

2 Methods should be safe, repeatable and appropriate to the question.

3 Conclusions should match the evidence and acknowledge limits.

Talk about it

Explain one idea in your own words. Give an example from real life, a drawing or an object if that helps.

Turn “Is our park good?” into a measurable question about path use or litter counts.

Choose a tally, sketch map or photograph for different evidence needs.

Identify a biased method that only samples one tiny area.

Write a conclusion that does not claim more than the data show.

Independent thinking

List one limitation and one improvement for a fictional survey.

Try it beyond the page

Real-world / hands-on connection

With adult supervision, complete a tiny public-place observation such as counting types of movement for five minutes; do not record names, faces or private details.

Before you finish

What did you notice?

What evidence, object or example helped you?

What would you change if you tried again?

Create something

Your project

Create a one-page fieldwork report: question, method, evidence, result, limitation and next question.

Use this space for planning, drawing, mapping, designing or notes.

Think deeper

1. Why should a fieldwork question be focused?

2. What is a limitation?

3. Why avoid collecting names/faces?

Quick review

1. In one sentence, explain the big idea of “Young Geographer Fieldwork: Observe, Record, Explain”.

2. Draw or write one example that shows you understand.

3. Choose one activity from this pack and explain the strategy you used.

4. Write one question you still have.

Answer & discussion notes

Use these as guidance, not scripts. Open questions can have different successful responses when the reasoning is sensible and evidence-based.

2. Suggested response

A factor that reduces what the investigation can confidently conclude.

3. Suggested response

They are unnecessary personal data for this learning task.

Review before publication

Check age fit, factual accuracy, clarity, accessibility, rights provenance and whether the activity works in practice. This file remains a review copy until those checks are signed off.
