Learning objective

Trace a simplified river journey and explain how water, landforms and human activity are connected.

Use this pack well

- Model the first example aloud, then let the learner try.
- Ask “How do you know?” more often than “Are you finished?”.
- Use real objects, talk, movement or observation when the activity suggests it.
- Stop or shorten the session if attention or enjoyment drops.
- Open-ended pages can have many successful answers.

Learn the idea

1 Rivers generally flow downhill under gravity from higher to lower ground.

2 Tributaries can join a larger river.

3 People use river environments, but activities can also change them.

Talk about it

Explain one idea in your own words. Give an example from real life, a drawing or an object if that helps.

Order source, tributary, confluence, river channel and mouth in a simplified diagram.

Explain why a river often follows lower ground.

Identify one human use and one possible environmental pressure.

Compare a river bend with a straight channel using map evidence.

Write a cautious statement about flood risk without claiming all rivers behave the same.

Try it beyond the page

Real-world / hands-on connection

Use an adult-selected atlas or public map to trace one named river from an inland area toward the sea; do not collect private location data.

Before you finish

What did you notice?

What evidence, object or example helped you?

What would you change if you tried again?

Create a fictional river-basin map with two tributaries, a settlement and one conservation decision.

Use this space for planning, drawing, mapping, designing or notes.

Think deeper

1. What is a tributary?

2. Why does water move downhill?

3. Why should river claims use evidence from a specific place?

Answer & discussion notes
