Learning objective

Place events in chronological order and distinguish date evidence from interpretation.

Use this pack well

- Model the first example aloud, then let the learner try.
- Ask “How do you know?” more often than “Are you finished?”.
- Use real objects, talk, movement or observation when the activity suggests it.
- Stop or shorten the session if attention or enjoyment drops.
- Open-ended pages can have many successful answers.

Learn the idea

1 Chronology orders events in time.

2 Primary and secondary sources can provide different kinds of evidence.

3 A source can be useful while still having limits or a viewpoint.

Talk about it

Explain one idea in your own words. Give an example from real life, a drawing or an object if that helps.

Order six dated events on a timeline.

Decide whether a diary, later textbook and old photograph are primary or secondary for a particular question.

Explain what a photograph can show and what it cannot prove.

Write a cautious claim using two pieces of evidence.

Identify one question that remains unanswered.

Try it beyond the page

Real-world / hands-on connection

Choose a family-safe historical object or public museum image with an adult and list observations before interpretations.

Before you finish

What did you notice?

What evidence, object or example helped you?

What would you change if you tried again?

Create a mini museum label for a fictional object with date, evidence, interpretation and one unanswered question.

1. What is chronology?

2. Can a source be useful and limited at the same time?

3. Why separate observation from interpretation?
