Learning objective

Compare selected European places using maps, climate, settlement and transport evidence while recognising diversity within countries.

Use this pack well

- Model the first example aloud, then let the learner try.
- Ask “How do you know?” more often than “Are you finished?”.
- Use real objects, talk, movement or observation when the activity suggests it.
- Stop or shorten the session if attention or enjoyment drops.
- Open-ended pages can have many successful answers.

Learn the idea

1 Europe contains many countries, languages, landscapes and communities.

2 Transport and trade networks connect places across borders.

3 A country-scale fact does not describe every local community.

Talk about it

Explain one idea in your own words. Give an example from real life, a drawing or an object if that helps.

Compare two fictional European city profiles using population, rainfall and public transport data.

Trace a rail or sea connection on an adult-selected map.

Identify and rewrite a statement that stereotypes an entire country.

Compare coastal and inland advantages for transport.

Write two questions that would require reliable sources rather than assumptions.

Try it beyond the page

Real-world / hands-on connection

Research one European place with an adult using two reputable sources and record three verified facts.

Before you finish

What did you notice?

What evidence, object or example helped you?

What would you change if you tried again?

Your project

Create a “same, different, diverse” comparison board for two fictional European places.

Think deeper

1. Why avoid saying everyone in one country is the same?

2. What is a network?

3. Why might ports develop on some coasts?

2. Draw or write one example that shows you understand.

3. Choose one activity from this pack and explain the strategy you used.

4. Write one question you still have.

Answer & discussion notes

Use these as guidance, not scripts. Open questions can have different successful responses when the reasoning is sensible and evidence-based.

2. Suggested response

A set of connected routes, places or systems.

3. Suggested response

They can connect sea transport with land routes where geography and infrastructure allow.
