Learning objective

Carry out a small, privacy-safe place inquiry using a focused question, systematic observations and cautious conclusions.

Use this pack well

- Model the first example aloud, then let the learner try.
- Ask “How do you know?” more often than “Are you finished?”.
- Use real objects, talk, movement or observation when the activity suggests it.
- Stop or shorten the session if attention or enjoyment drops.
- Open-ended pages can have many successful answers.

Learn the idea

1 Fieldwork begins with a question that can be observed or measured.

2 A consistent recording method improves comparison.

3 Conclusions should state limitations and avoid identifying private people.

Talk about it

Explain one idea in your own words. Give an example from real life, a drawing or an object if that helps.

Improve three vague fieldwork questions into measurable ones.

Design a tally for traffic type, litter count or land-use categories in a fictional site.

Identify why changing observation times can affect results.

Separate observation from opinion in five statements.

Write a cautious conclusion from a small sample and name one limitation.
