Learning objective

Improve observational drawing by comparing relative size, angle, shape and the spaces around objects.

Use this pack well

- Model the first example aloud, then let the learner try.
- Ask “How do you know?” more often than “Are you finished?”.
- Use real objects, talk, movement or observation when the activity suggests it.
- Stop or shorten the session if attention or enjoyment drops.
- Open-ended pages can have many successful answers.

Learn the idea

1 Observation drawing is about looking carefully rather than drawing a symbol from memory.

2 Relative proportion compares the size of one part with another.

3 Negative space can help reveal shape and placement.

Talk about it

Explain one idea in your own words. Give an example from real life, a drawing or an object if that helps.

Draw three everyday objects using only contour lines.

Compare width-to-height proportions before adding detail.

Sketch the negative space between two objects.

Use light guide marks to place major shapes before texture.

Annotate one revision you made after looking again.

Try it beyond the page

Real-world / hands-on connection

Arrange two safe household objects and draw them from one fixed viewpoint for ten focused minutes.

Before you finish

What did you notice?

What evidence, object or example helped you?

What would you change if you tried again?

Create something

Your project

Create a before/after observation page showing first sketch, revised sketch and three notes about what changed.

Use this space for planning, drawing, mapping, designing or notes.

Think deeper

1. What is negative space?

2. Why compare proportions?

3. Does observation drawing require photorealism?

Quick review

1. In one sentence, explain the big idea of “Observation Drawing: Proportion & Negative Space”.

2. Draw or write one example that shows you understand.

3. Choose one activity from this pack and explain the strategy you used.

4. Write one question you still have.

Answer & discussion notes

Use these as guidance, not scripts. Open questions can have different successful responses when the reasoning is sensible and evidence-based.

1. Suggested response

2. Suggested response

It helps parts relate accurately to one another.

3. Suggested response

No; the goal is attentive seeing and purposeful representation.

Review before publication
