Learning objective

Respond to artworks using observation, interpretation and questions while distinguishing what is visible from what is inferred.

Use this pack well

- Model the first example aloud, then let the learner try.
- Ask “How do you know?” more often than “Are you finished?”.
- Use real objects, talk, movement or observation when the activity suggests it.
- Stop or shorten the session if attention or enjoyment drops.
- Open-ended pages can have many successful answers.

Quality note

Learn the idea

1 Observation describes what can be seen or heard.

2 Interpretation suggests meaning and should be linked to evidence.

3 Context can add information about how and why work was made.

Talk about it

Explain one idea in your own words. Give an example from real life, a drawing or an object if that helps.

Separate observation from interpretation in six statements.

Choose three visual details that support an interpretation.

Generate two questions for an artist or curator.

Compare two works using line, shape, colour, material or mood.

Revise an interpretation after receiving new context.

Try it beyond the page

Real-world / hands-on connection

Use an adult-selected museum or gallery resource and discuss one work without copying the image into BrightPencil materials.

Before you finish

What did you notice?

What evidence, object or example helped you?

What would you change if you tried again?

Your project

Create an artwork-response card: notice, evidence, interpretation, question, connection.

Use this space for planning, drawing, mapping, designing or notes.

CHALLENGE

Think deeper

1. Is “the figure looks worried” observation or interpretation?

2. Why use evidence in an interpretation?

3. Can new context change a response?

Quick review

1. In one sentence, explain the big idea of “Responding to Art: Look, Notice, Interpret, Question”.

2. Draw or write one example that shows you understand.

3. Choose one activity from this pack and explain the strategy you used.

4. Write one question you still have.

Answer & discussion notes

Use these as guidance, not scripts. Open questions can have different successful responses when the reasoning is sensible and evidence-based.
