Learning objective

Explain a simplified catchment system and evaluate how land use can affect water movement and river environments.

Use this pack well

- Model the first example aloud, then let the learner try.
- Ask “How do you know?” more often than “Are you finished?”.
- Use real objects, talk, movement or observation when the activity suggests it.
- Stop or shorten the session if attention or enjoyment drops.
- Open-ended pages can have many successful answers.

Learn the idea

1 A catchment is an area where water drains toward a shared river, lake or outlet.

2 Tributaries connect parts of a river system.

3 Land cover and human activity can influence runoff, water quality and habitat.

Talk about it

Explain one idea in your own words. Give an example from real life, a drawing or an object if that helps.

Label source, tributary, confluence, channel, floodplain and mouth on a fictional diagram.

Trace where rain falling on three slopes would likely drain.

Compare runoff from planted ground and sealed paving as a model, not a universal claim.

Identify two human uses of rivers and two possible pressures.

Propose one evidence-based action to reduce litter or polluted runoff in a fictional catchment.

Try it beyond the page

Real-world / hands-on connection

With an adult, trace one river on a public map from inland areas toward a larger water body and note broad land uses.

Before you finish

What did you notice?

What evidence, object or example helped you?

What would you change if you tried again?

Your project

Design a fictional catchment map that balances homes, farming, paths and a protected wetland.

Use this space for planning, drawing, mapping, designing or notes.

Think deeper

1. What is a tributary?

2. Why does a catchment boundary matter?

3. Can one observation prove a long-term river trend?

Answer & discussion notes

Use these as guidance, not scripts. Open questions can have different successful responses when the reasoning is sensible and evidence-based.

1. Suggested response

A smaller stream or river that joins a larger one.

2. Suggested response

It helps show where water drains within the system.

3. Suggested response

No; repeated evidence over time is needed.
