Learning objective

Understand sampling, repeatable methods and cautious interpretation in an environmental story.

Use this pack well

- Model the first example aloud, then let the learner try.
- Ask “How do you know?” more often than “Are you finished?”.
- Use real objects, talk, movement or observation when the activity suggests it.
- Stop or shorten the session if attention or enjoyment drops.
- Open-ended pages can have many successful answers.

Read the story

PART 1

Think deeper

1. Why was “look around” too vague?

2. What made the method more repeatable?

3. Why did the group avoid claiming one area was permanently best?

Quick review

1. In one sentence, explain the big idea of “The Garden Survey”.

2. Draw or write one example that shows you understand.

3. Choose one activity from this pack and explain the strategy you used.

4. Write one question you still have.

Answer & discussion notes

Use these as guidance, not scripts. Open questions can have different successful responses when the reasoning is sensible and evidence-based.

1. Suggested response

Use details stated or strongly supported by the story.

2. Suggested response

Equivalent evidence-based wording is acceptable.

3. Suggested response

Open responses should explain reasoning using story evidence.

Review before publication

Check age fit, factual accuracy, clarity, accessibility, rights provenance and whether the activity works in practice. This file remains a review copy until those checks are signed off.
