Learning objective

Use overlap, relative size, horizon and simple one-point perspective to create spatial depth.

Use this pack well

- Model the first example aloud, then let the learner try.
- Ask “How do you know?” more often than “Are you finished?”.
- Use real objects, talk, movement or observation when the activity suggests it.
- Stop or shorten the session if attention or enjoyment drops.
- Open-ended pages can have many successful answers.

Learn the idea

1 Objects can appear farther away when they are smaller and closer to a horizon/vanishing system.

2 Overlap provides depth cues even without formal perspective.

3 Perspective is a representation system, not how objects physically shrink.

Talk about it

Explain one idea in your own words. Give an example from real life, a drawing or an object if that helps.

Build a clear model or organiser that shows: Objects can appear farther away when they are smaller and closer to a horizon/vanishing system.

Use supplied evidence to test this idea: Overlap provides depth cues even without formal perspective.

Compare two cases and explain where this principle matters: Perspective is a representation system, not how objects physically shrink.

Find one weak claim or assumption and revise it so it matches the evidence.

Write a short conclusion that states evidence, limitation and next question.

Try it beyond the page

Real-world / hands-on connection

Observe a corridor or safe outdoor view with an adult and note converging lines.

Before you finish

What did you notice?

What evidence, object or example helped you?

What would you change if you tried again?

Create something

Your project

Draw an imaginary street or room using horizon, vanishing point and overlapping objects.

Use this space for planning, drawing, mapping, designing or notes.

Think deeper

1. Do distant objects physically become smaller?

2. What is a vanishing point used for?

3. Can overlap alone suggest depth?
