Learning objective

Evaluate how art in shared spaces interacts with place, audience, history and differing viewpoints.

Use this pack well

- Model the first example aloud, then let the learner try.
- Ask “How do you know?” more often than “Are you finished?”.
- Use real objects, talk, movement or observation when the activity suggests it.
- Stop or shorten the session if attention or enjoyment drops.
- Open-ended pages can have many successful answers.

Learn the idea

1 Public art is experienced by many audiences in a shared setting.

2 People can respond differently while still discussing specific features and context.

3 Placement, scale and materials affect how a work relates to place.

Talk about it

Explain one idea in your own words. Give an example from real life, a drawing or an object if that helps.

Build a clear model or organiser that shows: Public art is experienced by many audiences in a shared setting.

Use supplied evidence to test this idea: People can respond differently while still discussing specific features and context.

Compare two cases and explain where this principle matters: Placement, scale and materials affect how a work relates to place.

Find one weak claim or assumption and revise it so it matches the evidence.

Write a short conclusion that states evidence, limitation and next question.

With an adult, view a public artwork in person or through an official cultural source.

What would you change if you tried again?
