Learning objective

Explore cultural and linguistic diversity through specific evidence while avoiding stereotypes and tokenism.

Use this pack well

- Model the first example aloud, then let the learner try.
- Ask “How do you know?” more often than “Are you finished?”.
- Use real objects, talk, movement or observation when the activity suggests it.
- Stop or shorten the session if attention or enjoyment drops.
- Open-ended pages can have many successful answers.

Learn the idea

1 Countries and cultures contain internal diversity.

2 Language, food, clothing or festivals are parts of culture, not complete definitions of people.

3 Responsible comparison uses specific sources and avoids “all people” claims.

Talk about it

Explain one idea in your own words. Give an example from real life, a drawing or an object if that helps.

Build a clear model or organiser that shows: Countries and cultures contain internal diversity.

Use supplied evidence to test this idea: Language, food, clothing or festivals are parts of culture, not complete definitions of people.

Compare two cases and explain where this principle matters: Responsible comparison uses specific sources and avoids “all people” claims.

Find one weak claim or assumption and revise it so it matches the evidence.

Write a short conclusion that states evidence, limitation and next question.

Try it beyond the page

Real-world / hands-on connection

With an adult, use a museum, library or official cultural source to research one specific tradition or language fact.

What evidence, object or example helped you?

What would you change if you tried again?
