Learning objective

Compare age-appropriate historical sources and distinguish evidence, inference and interpretation.

Use this pack well

- Model the first example aloud, then let the learner try.
- Ask “How do you know?” more often than “Are you finished?”.
- Use real objects, talk, movement or observation when the activity suggests it.
- Stop or shorten the session if attention or enjoyment drops.
- Open-ended pages can have many successful answers.

Learn the idea

1 Primary and secondary sources answer different kinds of questions.

2 Corroboration compares sources for agreement, difference and context.

3 Historical interpretation should acknowledge limits and uncertainty in the evidence.

Talk about it

Explain one idea in your own words. Give an example from real life, a drawing or an object if that helps.

Build a clear model or organiser that shows: Primary and secondary sources answer different kinds of questions.

Use supplied evidence to test this idea: Corroboration compares sources for agreement, difference and context.

Compare two cases and explain where this principle matters: Historical interpretation should acknowledge limits and uncertainty in the evidence.

Find one weak claim or assumption and revise it so it matches the evidence.

Write a short conclusion that states evidence, limitation and next question.

Visit a trusted museum/archive website with an adult and compare two items about one topic.
