Learning objective

Use respectful boundaries in face-to-face and digital interactions and recognise when adult help is needed.

Use this pack well

- Model the first example aloud, then let the learner try.
- Ask “How do you know?” more often than “Are you finished?”.
- Use real objects, talk, movement or observation when the activity suggests it.
- Stop or shorten the session if attention or enjoyment drops.
- Open-ended pages can have many successful answers.

Learn the idea

1 Consent and boundaries apply to ordinary sharing, photos, belongings and participation.

2 Private information should not be pressured out of someone.

3 Threats, repeated harassment or unsafe requests require trusted-adult help.

Talk about it

Explain one idea in your own words. Give an example from real life, a drawing or an object if that helps.

Build a clear model or organiser that shows: Consent and boundaries apply to ordinary sharing, photos, belongings and participation.

Use supplied evidence to test this idea: Private information should not be pressured out of someone.

Compare two cases and explain where this principle matters: Threats, repeated harassment or unsafe requests require trusted-adult help.

Find one weak claim or assumption and revise it so it matches the evidence.

Write a short conclusion that states evidence, limitation and next question.

Review family digital-sharing rules with a parent/caregiver.
