Learning objective

Combine multiple clues to identify who has which item or position.

Use this pack well

- Model the first example aloud, then let the learner try.
- Ask “How do you know?” more often than “Are you finished?”.
- Use real objects, talk, movement or observation when the activity suggests it.
- Stop or shorten the session if attention or enjoyment drops.
- Open-ended pages can have many successful answers.

Learn the idea

1 crossing out impossibilities helps

2 each clue adds information

3 a final answer must satisfy all clues

Talk about it

Explain one idea in your own words. Give an example from real life, a drawing or an object if that helps.

Ava, Ben, Cy choose red/blue/green. Ben=blue; Ava not red; Cy not green. Solve.

Three pets belong to three owners using two clues.

Mark impossible pairings with X.

Explain which clue gave the strongest information.

Check the completed grid against every clue.

Try it beyond the page

Real-world / hands-on connection

Try one puzzle with physical cards or objects before solving it on paper.

Before you finish

What did you notice?

What evidence, object or example helped you?

What would you change if you tried again?

Create a 3x3 logic grid with names, items and three clues.

Think deeper

1. What strategy helped most?

2. How did you check your answer?

3. Could there be another valid answer? Explain.

Quick review

1. In one sentence, explain the big idea of “Mini Logic Grid: Use Every Clue”.

2. Draw or write one example that shows you understand.

3. Choose one activity from this pack and explain the strategy you used.

4. Write one question you still have.

Answer & discussion notes

Use these as guidance, not scripts. Open questions can have different successful responses when the reasoning is sensible and evidence-based.

1. Suggested response

Expect a named strategy such as draw, list, cross out, act out or check.

2. Suggested response

The check should test the original conditions.

3. Suggested response

Some puzzles allow alternatives only when all clues/rules still fit.

Review before publication

Check age fit, factual accuracy, clarity, accessibility, rights provenance and whether the activity works in practice. This file remains a review copy until those checks are signed off.
