Keep practice short and positive

- 1 Read the instruction together once.
- 2 Let the learner try before stepping in.
- 3 Ask: How did you work that out?
- 4 Correct one small thing at a time.
- 5 Finish with one success the learner can name.

Answer guidance

Open drawing and writing tasks can have more than one good answer. For number, language and knowledge questions, check the learner can explain the idea rather than only guess. Online Practice gives immediate gentle feedback for the matching digital activity.
