Learning objective

Interpret and create imagery, figurative language, sound pattern and tone while explaining the effect of language choices.

Use this pack well

- Model the first example aloud, then let the learner try.
- Ask “How do you know?” more often than “Are you finished?”.
- Use real objects, talk, movement or observation when the activity suggests it.
- Stop or shorten the session if attention or enjoyment drops.
- Open-ended pages can have many successful answers.

Learn the idea

1 Tone is the attitude or feeling conveyed through choices in language and structure.

2 Imagery can appeal to several senses and need not be literal.

3 Sound patterns such as alliteration or rhythm can support meaning but should not replace it.

Talk about it

Explain one idea in your own words. Give an example from real life, a drawing or an object if that helps.

Compare how two short original lines create different tones.

Explain one metaphor without turning it into a literal claim.

Revise a cliché into fresher imagery.

Mark words that create a calm, tense or joyful tone.

Write four lines where sound and image support the same mood.

Try it beyond the page

Real-world / hands-on connection

Read a short age-appropriate poem aloud and notice one sound or pacing choice that affects interpretation.

Before you finish

What did you notice?

What evidence, object or example helped you?

What would you change if you tried again?

Create something

Create an original eight-line poem plus a short note explaining two deliberate craft choices.

Use this space for planning, drawing, mapping, designing or notes.

Think deeper

1. Is figurative language meant to be interpreted only literally?

2. What creates tone?

3. Can a simple image be effective without many adjectives?
