Learning objective

Recognise several common vowel teams and use them to decode and spell familiar words.

Use this pack well

- Model the first example aloud, then let the learner try.
- Ask “How do you know?” more often than “Are you finished?”.
- Use real objects, talk, movement or observation when the activity suggests it.
- Stop or shorten the session if attention or enjoyment drops.
- Open-ended pages can have many successful answers.

Learn the idea

1 Two letters can work together to represent a vowel sound.

2 Different spellings can represent similar sounds.

3 Position in a word can help with spelling choices, but patterns have exceptions.

Talk about it

Explain one idea in your own words. Give an example from real life, a drawing or an object if that helps.

Sort: rain, play, seed, team, boat, snow by vowel team.

Complete: tr__n, pl__, gr__n, b__t.

Read a sentence and underline each vowel team.

Compare two spellings for a similar sound, such as ai/ay.

Write one new word for each target pattern.

Try it beyond the page

Real-world / hands-on connection

Make six vowel-team header cards and sort word cards beneath them.

Before you finish

What evidence, object or example helped you?

What would you change if you tried again?
